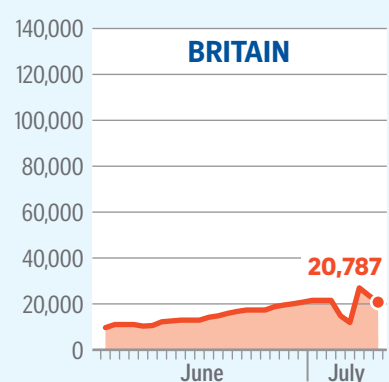


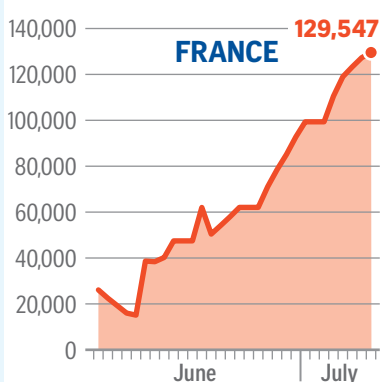
Covid-19 numbers and how cases are being dealt with

Several countries are seeing a resurgence in Covid-19 infections. Here's what some countries are doing or plan to do.

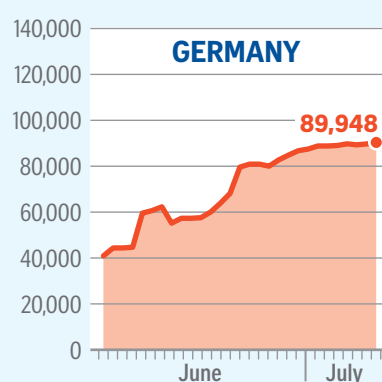
Daily new confirmed Covid-19 cases (7-day rolling average)*



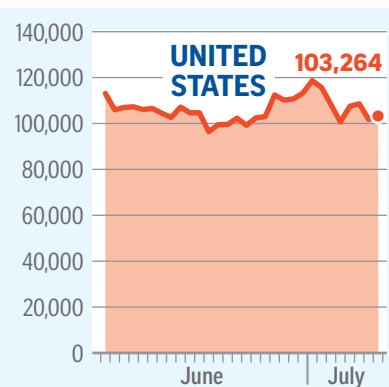
- In England, the government suggests wearing masks in crowded and enclosed spaces
- Scottish government strongly recommends wearing masks in indoor public spaces and on public transport



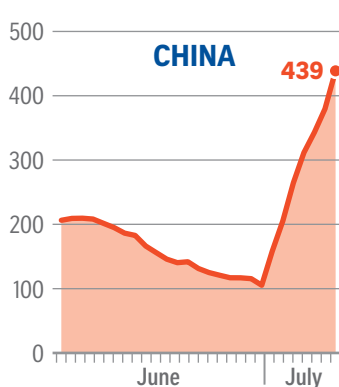
- French city of Nice makes masks compulsory on public transport from today
- French PM, health minister ask people to wear masks in high-risk places but have not mandated it



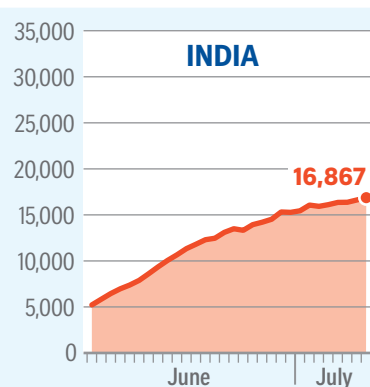
- Masks required on public transport, and in hospitals and nursing homes
- German government working on new Covid-19 regulations for possible case spikes later in the year



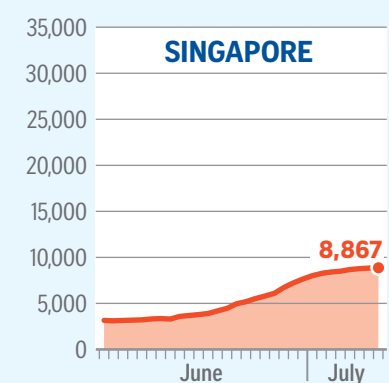
- Centres for Disease Control and Prevention recommending masks indoors for 38 out of 58 counties in California, where there has been a surge in cases
- California's Alameda county reinstated an indoor mask mandate last month but rescinded it three weeks later



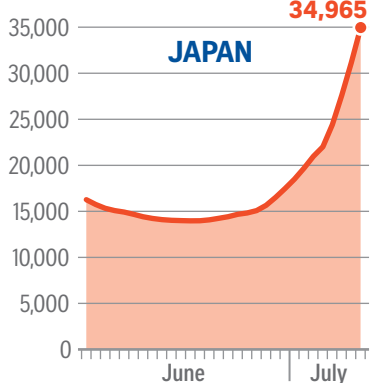
- National authorities are reducing scrutiny of citizens' travel history to monitor Covid-19 from 14 days to seven
- In Shanghai, cinemas have reopened as part of the city's gradual resumption of daily activities



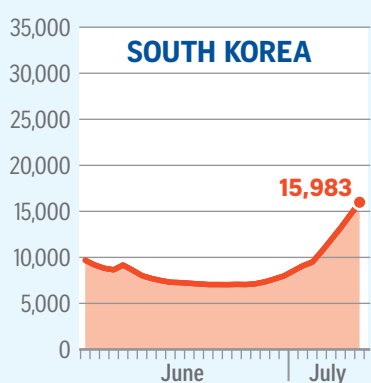
- Gap between the second vaccine dose and a booster shot reduced to six months from the existing nine months for all adults



- Masks continue to be required indoors and on public transport, but are optional outdoors
- On July 7, hospitals and residential care homes imposed limits on the number of visitors for four weeks



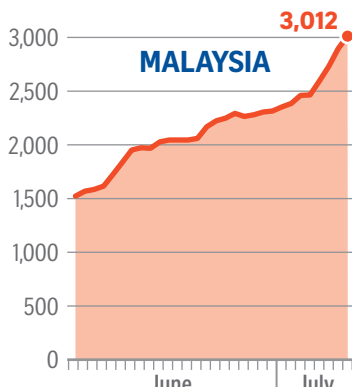
- Launch of a domestic tourism campaign looks set to be delayed
- Free-and-easy foreign travellers are likely to remain shut out for some time to come



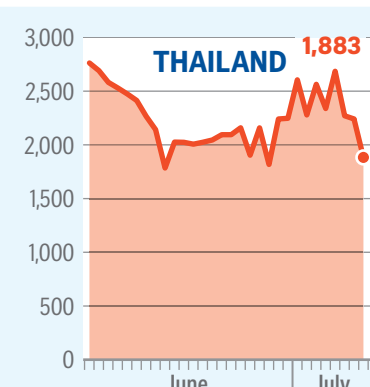
- Health Ministry discussing counter-measures with medical experts
- Revised plans, which could include social distancing measures, will be announced on Wednesday



- Public activity restrictions in Jakarta and some neighbouring areas until Aug 1
- Government to make getting booster shots mandatory for those wanting to engage in activities in public places



- Face masks optional (although encouraged) outdoors, but still required indoors



- Government monitoring the situation
- It is also looking into ways to encourage people to get booster shots

NOTE: *All figures as at July 8. Due to limited testing, the number of confirmed cases is lower than the true number of infections.
