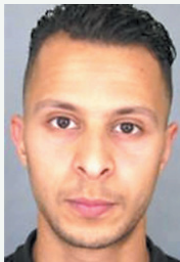


# Key developments

**As France set its sights on targets linked to the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria (ISIS) in Syria, more details emerged yesterday about the suspects and other countries around the world spoke about the threat posed by militants.**

## HUNT FOR SUSPECTS

French police conducted sweeping raids across the country under a state of emergency that President Francois Hollande declared last Friday. They released a photo of 26-year-old French national Salah Abdeslam (below), saying he "may have been involved in the Paris attacks". His brother Ibrahim Abdeslam was named by French media as the bomber who died at the Comptoir Voltaire cafe. Another brother of theirs was arrested in Belgium but later released.



## MALAYSIAN RAIDS

Malaysian police chief Khalid Abu Bakar said they have nabbed five suspected militants in their latest raids last week in Johor and Selangor.

Malaysia's Defence Minister Hishammuddin Hussein told reporters that several Malaysian leaders, including himself, had been put on an ISIS hit list since March.



## MINUTE OF SILENCE

France and other countries in Europe observed a minute's silence at noon yesterday in memory of the victims of the worst-ever terror attacks on French soil.

In Paris, President Francois Hollande and his Cabinet (below), all dressed in black, joined students at the Sorbonne University to pay their respects.

## PARISIANS RETURN TO WORK



The Louvre (above) and other museums, as well as the Eiffel Tower, opened yesterday afternoon after shutting their doors over the weekend.

Parisians returned to work under the watchful gaze of armed police and soldiers, giving the French capital the air of a city under siege.

## AT G-20: TACKLING TERROR

Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong said the scourge of terrorism is a long-time problem that calls for a multi-pronged approach.

He told G-20 leaders that countries have to be resolute in dealing with extremists at home while cooperating closely with other nations so that terrorists are left "in no doubt that they are up against a formidable coalition of countries that are determined to stop them".
