## Future City Vision

The brightly coloured illustrations here depict a futuristic Singapore as imagined by some 100 students. Illustrator Michael Ng translated their doodles into this art installation.



## HomeScapes

- A photography exhibition capturing the untold stories of the average Singaporean home. The images were curated by the director of the Singapore International Photography Festival, Ms Gwen Lee.



## Wordplay!

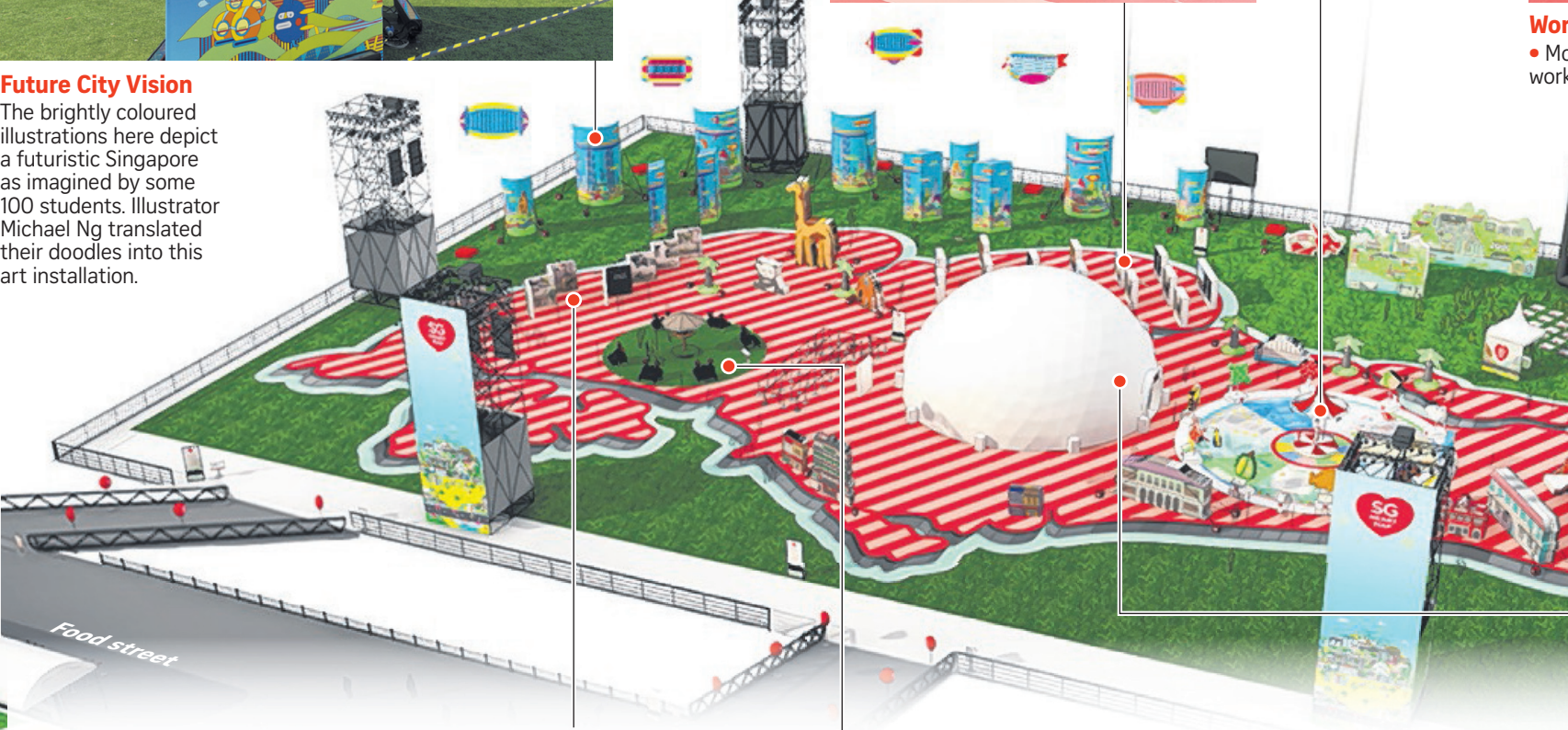
- Modelled after a typical children's playground, this space features 20 literary works in the form of prose and poetry authored by 10 established local writers.
- The literary pieces were inspired by stories that Singaporeans have shared about their childhood days.

## 50 First Kisses and Outdoor Cinema

Royston Tan's short film 50 First Kisses, about the heartwarming moments of 50 Singaporean couples and specially made for the festival, will be screened here. Other local films such as Army Daze and 881 will also be screened.

## Dome

A film showcasing all 50 SG Heart Map places will be projected inside the dome, while a series of animations will be projected on the outside.

## SonicMemories

- This audio installation lets visitors re-live familiar experiences at national, cultural and celebratory events through sound.
- The bright red post boxes in this installation serve as speakers, and visitors are encouraged to go up close to listen to the recordings.
