What is SGSecure?

SGSecure is a national movement to get people to stay alert, united and strong in the face of the terror threat. It will train them to prevent an attack, respond to one should it happen, and remind them not to let it disrupt our way of life.

WHY NOW?

• Terror groups like ISIS are becoming more active in South-east Asia, and targeting Singapore

 Self-radicalised individuals may carry out "lone wolf" attacks that are hard to detect and stop

WHAT ARE THE KEY MESSAGES?

LESSONS IN HOW TO REACT

In the event of a weapons attack, people should:



RUN away and take others along



HIDE from the attackers



TELL the police when it is safe to do so



SGSECURE APP

- People can download the app on their smartphones
- Police and the Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF) will broadcast important alerts during major emergencies via the app
- People can also send messages, photos or videos of incidents or request help

WHAT'S BEING DONE?

Residents, students and workers are being trained in various ways.



NEIGHBOURHOODS

- Emergency Preparedness Days are getting a revamp, with drills for residents to test their response in an attack
- People will be trained in how to give first aid to victims and, if needed, use an automated external defibrillator (AED)
- The revamped programme has been tried out at three constituencies, with at least six more to be added by March 2017. The aim is to reach all 89 constituencies by 2019
- There are plans to have at least one trained person in every household, and one AED in every other HDB block. There are about 10,000 HDB blocks

SCHOOLS



- A storybook and card game, targeted at Primary 3 and Primary 6 pupils, should be ready by 2017
- These will teach pupils how to respond to an attack, cope in its aftermath, and stress the importance of staying alert, united and strong
- National Police Cadet Corps and National Civil Defence Cadet Corps cadets have also

- started a Keep Singapore Safe programme at eight secondary schools that will be extended to other uniformed groups and more schools
- SGSecure mobile exhibitions will be held to sensitise students to security challenges and threats
- For example, the exhibition includes information on what students can do in the event of an attack and how they should respond in the immediate aftermath when racial and religious tensions may be high

WORKPLACES



 Security staff and identified workers at companies will be trained as SGSecure responders under police's Project Guardian and SCDF's Company Emergency Response Team schemes

- The aim is to have a pool of first responders who can keep an emergency situation under control before the authorities arrive
- Counter-terrorism seminars specific to sectors such as manufacturing, chemical and hospitality have also been planned
