ROHINGYA

She did not refer to Rakhine Muslims as Rohingya, as per official policy.

MILITARY

She did not address allegations of rights abuse by the military, saying that there had been "no armed clashes or clearance operations" since Sept 5.

The security forces have been instructed to adhere strictly to the code of conduct in carrying out security operations, exercise all due restraint and to take full measures to avoid collateral damage and the harming of innocent civilians.
