THE ROYAL CREMATORIUM

- Custom-made structure for the royal funeral
- Modelled after Mount Meru, the centre of the universe in Buddhist cosmology.
- Gold-painted structure
- The tower will be decorated by over 500 sculptures of animals, gods and mythical creatures, including a pair of royal dogs
- Four monks sit and pray in the corner pavilions surrounding the main structure
- Fire screen (centre) features paintings depicting 4,000 years of royal activities
- Enshrines the sandalwood royal urn


