

Singapore-China business travel to resume

Strict procedures and measures will be in place to ensure the health of approved travellers and those in the community, when travel resumes between Singapore and six Chinese regions. With the new agreement, travellers will not have to be quarantined upon arrival.

The process

- Sponsor organisation in the other country submits an application on behalf of the traveller.
- Those successful will receive an approval letter.



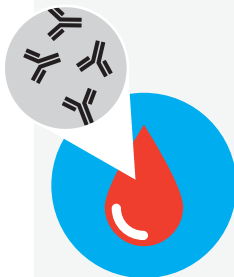
- Traveller applies for a visa if required and submits health declarations online.
- A Chinese resident who wants to fly to Singapore must have stayed in one of the six stipulated regions for seven days prior to departure.



- A Covid-19 polymerase chain reaction test, paid for by the traveller, is taken within 48 hours of departure and must be negative.



- Upon landing, another Covid-19 test is done.
- China requires an additional serology test for Covid-19 antibodies.



- The traveller will proceed to a declared self-sourced accommodation in Singapore and in China, to a location designated by the local authority for one or two days until test results are released.
- Those found to be infected will be hospitalised and must pay for their own treatment.



- Those who are cleared must follow a controlled itinerary for the first 14 days and are not allowed to use mass public transport such as buses or trains during this period.
- Singapore requires travellers to download the TraceTogether app, while in China, travellers must use China's local Health QR code.



Added measures for Singapore travellers in China

- Prior approval is required for travel between the six designated areas and travel outside of these regions is allowed only after staying in the country for 14 days.
- When back in Singapore, travellers must monitor their health and comply with existing measures.
