Actress Jo Tan (right) delivers a tour de force in this live-streamed performance, which is available on YouTube for a limited period of time. Not only does she play multiple characters, but she also wrote the script for this one-woman show.

Mousy Geok Yen is a public relations executive, engaged to a nice insurance agent Matthew. Her safe, stable life gets turned upside down when on an impulse, she attends an office party in the guise of a man, Stirling da Silva. She discovers the drag scene courtesy of her expatriate boss and drag queen Ethan, and finds a new lease of life in inhabiting the straight-talking male persona of Stirling.

Tan's script, developed under the dramaturgy of Checkpoint Theatre and staged under the auspices of T:>Works' N.O.W. festival, is a multi-layered marvel.

Through the girl-next-door lens of Geok Yen, Tan excavates the many layers of social expectations encoded in gender roles. From the dorky cismale assumptions of Matthew to the traumatised angst of Ethan to the awakening cisgender feminism of Geok Yen, the script deftly addresses discrimination, sexism and chauvinism with nuance, sensitivity and a large dose of humour that is very often laugh-out-loud funny.

Most impressively, Tan switches characters at the drop of a pair of sunglasses, the toss of a feather boa and the change of an accent. The minimal props, combined with precision-timed cuts to different camera angles, help cue the audience to follow the lightning-fast dialogue



exchanges. Film-maker Jasmine Ng proves a dab hand at helping to bridge the gap between theatre and video in her theatre debut as director.

This thought-provoking watch about what it means to be female is a right royal treat, perfect for the long

TASTES OF OUR TIME: COOK WITH CHRISTOPHER

Food scholar and cookbook author Christopher Tan (left) has a nice mini-series of three videos created to highlight the National Museum of Singapore's three history galleries. Each episode is dedicated to a particular time period, and Tan demonstrates a recipe inspired by

Episode One (str.sg/JeCV) features nankhatai, an Indian shortbread biscuit. Episode Two (str.sg/JeCr) offers citrus barley water, while Episode Three (str.sg/JeCK) dishes up satay ayam goreng (above right). The first two recipes are simple ones that novice cooks can try their hand at, while the satay ayam goreng is a bit fiddlier.

The recipes are nice hooks to hang little snippets of history on. For example, in Episode One, Tan talks



about the cosmopolitan influences of the 1920s, which have lingered on in today's local cuisines, in the form of confections like nankhatai, rock buns and chicken pies. And Episode Three features classic kitchen utensils such as a mortar and pestle and an iron wok and spatula, which are in the museum's collection.

CANTAPP: THE GENERAL PROLOGUE – AN EDITION **IN AN APP**

Actor-director Terry Jones was best known as one of the members of the legendary Monty Python comedy team. But he was also a mediaeval scholar who published two books about Chaucer and his works. This app, which reads Chaucer's The Canterbury Tales in Middle English, was the last big academic project Jones worked on before his death in January at age 77.

It is a rather disconcerting experience to first hear Middle English, as the pronunciation is at once familiar and foreign. The desktop version (right) of the app is the best, as the text in both the original Middle English and modern translation pops up in karaoke

fashion so you can read as you listen. But if you are an adventurous soul, you could just wing it on the mobile app, available on both Apple and Android platforms.



This is part of an international project spearheaded by University of Saskatchewan English professor Peter Robinson, and apparently the team has enough material for two more apps. So Chaucer fans and
