

Malaysia's MCO rules

Malaysia imposed its third lockdown, for 27 days, starting from Wednesday, May 12 until June 7. To prevent further economic damage, most business activities are allowed compared with the previous two movement control order periods. Here are some dos and don'ts during the period.

DOs



Most business activities will remain open, but with only 30 per cent of a firm's management in the office.



Public transport including trains and ferries will be operational with health protocols.



Petrol stations will operate between 6am and 10pm. Those located beside highways can open for 24 hours.



Night markets to operate between 4pm and 10pm, monitored by municipal authorities.



Barbers and hairdressers, laundrettes, animal clinics and car-wash operations can open between 6am and 10pm.



Prayer service in a mosque, church or temple is restricted to between 20 and 50 people, depending on its size.



Solo outdoor recreational activities such as jogging and cycling are allowed.

DON'Ts



No inter-state or inter-district travel except for work, with employees carrying a company letter or wearing an official work tag.



No inviting people over for Hari Raya or holding mass gatherings.



Schools and educational institutions are shut, except international schools with external exams.



Restaurant dine-ins are banned but customers are allowed take-outs between 6am and 10pm.



Bars and pubs, cinemas, reflexology and pedicure outlets are shut.
