



### Biles pulls out of gymnastics events

After one vault in the women's team final, US star Simone Biles withdrew, citing concerns about her mental health. A day later, she opted out of the individual all-around event, where she was the defending champion, and also pulled out of today's vault and uneven bars finals.



Austrian Anna Kiesenhofer's win in the women's road race was one of the biggest upsets in Olympic cycling history. The máthematician was considered a novice compared to her rivals, who included defending champions Anna van der Breggen and several world champions but she powered through the 147km course to win by 75 seconds

Size isn't everything Flora Duffy's victory in the women's triathlon was Bermuda's first Olympic gold, giving her country – with a population of 70,000 – the distinction of being the smallest nation to achieve such a feat. Trap shooter Alessandra Perilli's bronze and mixed trap silver with Marco Gian Berti sent San Marino and its 34,000 inhabitants into ecstasy. The tiny landlocked European country is the smallest to clinch an Olympic medal.

# South-east Asia's women come to the fore

Thailand has won nine Olympic titles, five in weightlifting and four in boxing. Panipak Wongpattanakit became the kingdom's first taekwondo gold medallist thanks to her dramatic win in the women's 49kg final. Weightlifter Hidilyn Diaz (right) achieved a childhood dream and also ended the Philippines' 97-year wait for an Olympic gold thanks to her triumph in the 55kg division.
